

- World's version versus the Biblical Version
- Optimistic &/or Naive No firm foundation
 - It might or might not happen no real confidence
 - Keep trying or give up
- Solidified by The Word of God Very Firm

- According to a passage for Our Daily Bread: True hope is dynamic & powerful because it considers the circumstances of life realistically - & then confidently rests in the promises & character of God.
- The Word tells us to Hope in the Lord, the Word tells us God has plans to give us Hope and a future (**Jeremiah 29:11**). But nowhere in the Bible does it say that Hope brought on a miracle from the Lord. It wasn't by Hope that Jesus raised Lazarus from the death. It wasn't with Hope that Jesus fed the multitude. All those acts were done in Faith. (Therebelchristian.com/blog/the difference between faith and hope)

- Hope doesn't take the place of Faith
 - Now faith is the assurance (title deed, confirmation) of things hoped for (divinely guaranteed), and the evidence of things not seen [the conviction of their reality—faith comprehends as fact what cannot be experienced by the physical senses].
- Hope is based upon and enhanced by Faith
- <u>True hope is unseen</u>: *Romans 8:24* ²⁴ For in this hope we were saved [by faith]. But hope [the object of] which is seen is not hope. For who hopes for what he already sees? ²⁵ But if we hope for what we do not see, we wait eagerly for it with patience and composure.
- Hope is based upon knowing God, His Promises and His Faithfulness
 - **Hebrews 10:23** Let us seize and hold tightly the confession of our hope without wavering, for He who promised is reliable and trustworthy and faithful [to His word];

- Source of Hope
 - Romans 15:13: May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing [through the experience of your faith] that by the power of the Holy Spirit you will abound in hope and overflow with confidence in His promises.
 - Hope comes from God: Psalm 39:7 "And now, Lord, for what do I expectantly wait? My hope [my contident expectation] is in You.
 - Hope is a gift:
 - Romans 5:2-5: ² Through Him we also have access by faith into this [remarkable state of] grace in which we [firmly and safely and securely] stand. Let us rejoice in our and the confident assurance of [experiencing and enjoying] the glory of [our great] God [the manifestation of His excellence and power]. And not only this, but [with joy] let us exult in our sufferings and rejoice in our hardships, knowing that hardship (distress, pressure, trouble) produces patient endurance; and endurance, proven character (spiritual maturity); and proven character, hope and confident assurance [of eternal salvation]. Such hope [in God's promises] never disappoints us, because God's love has been abundantly poured out within our hearts through the Holy Spirit who was given to us.

- Hope is versatile it looks different in different situations Because it relies on the goodness & faithfulness of God, it has many faces to respond fully to the different experiences of life:
- <u>Hope is courageous</u>: 2 Corinthians 3:12 ¹² Since we have such a [glorious] hope and confident expectation, we speak with great courage
- <u>Hope is patient</u>: *1Thessalonians 1:2-3* ² We give thanks to God always for all of you, continually mentioning you in our prayers; ³ recalling unceasingly before our God and Father your work energized by faith, and your service motivated by love and unwavering hope in [the return of] our Lord Jesus Christ.
- <u>Hope endures</u>: *Proverbs 23:18* Surely there is a future [and a reward], And your hope & expectation will not be cut off

• <u>Hope is expectant</u>: *Titus 2:13-14* ¹¹ For the [remarkable, undeserved] grace of God that ^[a] brings salvation has appeared to all men. ¹² It teaches us to reject ungodliness and worldly (immoral) desires, and to live sensible, upright, and godly lives [lives with a purpose that reflect spiritual maturity] in this present age, ¹³ awaiting and confidently expecting the [fulfillment of our] blessed hope and the glorious appearing of our great God and Savior, Christ Jesus, ¹⁴ who [willingly] gave Himself [to be crucified] on our behalf to redeem us and purchase our freedom from all wickedness, and to purify for Himself a chosen and very special people to be His own possession, who are enthusiastic for doing what is good.

- Hope is a source of stability:
- **Hebrews 6:18-19**: ¹⁸ so that by two unchangeable things [His promise and His oath] in which it is impossible for God to lie, we who have fled [to Him] for refuge would have strong encouragement and indwelling strength to hold tightly to the hope set before us. ¹⁹ This hope [this confident assurance] we have as an anchor of the soul [it cannot slip and it cannot break down under whatever pressure bears upon it]—a safe and steadfast hope that enters within the veil [of the heavenly temple, that most Holy Place in which the very presence of God dwells]

- Hope has a purifying effect:
- 1 John 3:2-3: ² Beloved, we are [even here and] now children of God, and it is not yet made clear what we will be [after His coming]. We know that when He comes and is revealed, we will [as His children] be like Him, because we will see Him just as He is [in all His glory]. ³ And everyone who has this hope [confidently placed] in Him purifies himself, just as He is pure (holy, undefiled, guiltless).

- How Do We Maintain Our Gift Of Hope:
- **Hebrews 10: 23-25** ²³ Let us seize and hold tightly the confession of our hope without wavering, for He who promised is reliable and trustworthy and faithful [to His word]; ²⁴ and let us consider [thoughtfully] how we may encourage one another to love and to do good deeds, ²⁵ not forsaking our meeting together [as believers for worship and instruction], as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another; and all the more [faithfully] as you see the day [of Christ's return] approaching.

CONCLUSION

- Do not mistake Hope for Faith
- It is possible to have Hope without Faith
- You have to make sure you aren't just hopeful. HOPE IN THE LORD! Don't stop
 having hope, don't stop having an optimistic attitude. But don't stop
 checking yourself. Make sure what you have is hope and faith combined.
- According to Kenneth Hagin (Rhema.org): To get our prayers answered, we
 must be in faith, not hope. There's a difference between the two. Sometimes
 we think we're in faith, but we're not.

- In the Book of Romans, the word hope occurs 15 times and is connected with the believer's perseverance through various experiences by faith and the Word of God.
 - (1) Hope sustains us when the odds appear against us (Romans 4:18).
 - (2) Hope produces joy because it looks beyond the immediate circumstances to a promise from God (*Romans 5:2; 12:12; 15:13*).
 - (3) Hope overcomes disappointment because there is the knowledge of God's love no matter what (*Romans 5:5*)
 - (4) Hope gives us a certain expectation now as we wait for the future of our salvation to come (*Romans 8:24, 25*).
 - (5) Hope is fed by the Word of God filling us with His testimony about Himself as we apply it and trust it each day of our lives (*Romans 15:4*).
